1.2 Defining SDG 5 (1)

- Goal number 5 is a basic human right according to the UN and has two main components: (1) gender equality, and (2) empowerment of women and girls. They both aim at:
 - ractices against all women and girls everywhere
 - promoting reforms as well as adopting and strengthening sound policies and enforceable legislation
- Goal 5 is measured by 9 targets and 14 indicators



5.4 Recognize and value unpaid care and domestic work through the provision of public services, infrastructure and social protection policies...

5.A Undertake reforms to give women equal rights to economic resources, and access to ownership and control over land and other forms of property, financial services, ...



Example of interlinkages between SDG 5 & SDG 1







• Example of interlinkages between SDG 5 & SDG 3




• E.g. Access to sexual and reproductive health and rights (5.6) is immediately connected to reducing maternal mortality (3.3)






Example of interlinkages between SDG 5 & SDG 8








• E.g. Women's full participation in economy and political life reinforces productivity increases in the economy (8.2) and decent job creation (8.3)





Example of interlinkages between SDG 5 & SDG 4








• E.g. Ending discrimination against women (5.1) prevents discrimination on girls from education at all levels (4.1; 4.2;4.3; 4.4)





Example of interlinkages between SDG 5 & SDG 16








• Women's full participation in economy and political life (5.5) leads to rising female political and workforce participation and lower levels of corruption (16.5; 16.6)

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Challenges of SDG 5

 The previous agreements failed to reach their goals ☐ criticism of the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) with the low impact they reached.

- middle) worldwide are hold by women.
 Reduce physical and/or sexual violence.
 I in 5 women worldwide report physical and/or sexual violence, 49 countries have no laws specifically protecting women from domestic violence (UN Women, SDG 5).
- Eliminate female genital mutilation

1.3 Good Practices of SDG 5

- Uganda
 - adopted a set of National Priority Gender Equality Indicators in order to monitor the progress towards the goals of SDG 5
 - 30 percent gender quota for deliberative bodies of the local government
 - campaign in partnership with the United Kingdom "which aims to tackle the scourge of modern slavery" by encouraging women to build a life in Nigeria and with it avoid slavery (Global Citizen).
